In 1999, a group of local volunteers courageously began trailblazing best-outcome advocacy for foster children in our area. As I look back at the past 25 years, I realize how difficult it is to fully quantify the impact Enotah CASA volunteers have had on thousands of children's lives, most of whom are now thriving adults with their own families.

As you open this report, our hope is you can begin to get a glimpse of how one adult, volunteering anywhere between 6-12 hours per month, changes a child's story. We believe that **EVERY** child deserves a **champion adult** who will advocate for their best interests.

<u>CASA Volunteers Needed</u>: Right now, for every foster child in our Enotah Judicial Circuit to have their own **adult champion**, we need 15 more volunteers. We provide extensive training and support so you can truly champion children who need YOUR voice.

<u>Friends of CASA</u>: As a Friend of CASA you will engage the community by promoting or helping at community awareness, fundraising events, and encouraging others to support this critical work for foster children.

Home Sweet Home!

Twelve-year old "Bria" looked so small and frightened when CASA Mary met her. You see, Bria had experienced abuse no 12- year old girl should ever know. And sadly, she witnessed someone shoot and kill one of her parents. CASA Mary met Bria shortly after she was placed with another family member. Mary began to advocate for Bria's mental & medical health care, and additional academic mentoring. Mary was able to help Bria get

funding for summer camp. It was a joy to hear Bria talk about her camp experiences. Pictures of Bria at camp showed her laughing and being so carefree. Slowly, Bria began trusting Mary, even opening up about her fear of living with her mother who would soon be released from prison. Mary quickly began collecting information and collaborating with Bria's mental health providers, case managers, and others. Mary's reports to the Court and her relationship with Bria, allowed her to be a critical voice for Bria. After two years, Mary couldn't hold back the tears when Bria's extended family was granted permanent guardianship so Bria now has a safe, loving, and permanent home.


